The key objective is to enable the enrolled students and scholars to become critical thinkers, proficient users of English language rooted in native culture and literary traditions. Therefore the academic programmes offered by the department are designed and administered, keeping in mind the juxtaposition of tradition and modernity represented in literary narratives. The Department puts in sincere efforts for inculcating in its students the competence which is communicative, linguistic, inter-cultural and literary in nature vis-à-vis evolving trends, methodologies and approaches in English literature and language.

Word is World

Indian grammarian Bhartrhari said that the world would have been a darker place if the light of knowledge in the form of words would not have been there. Even Buddha said that language is primarily a tool for communication and for pointing to the truth, a means to dream enlightenment. In fact words shape our worldview; language being a powerful instrument, it gives birth to our thoughts.

Indian knowledge systems are primarily language driven and postulate that realization of knowledge is not possible in the absence of flow of words. Indic traditions respect words as *Braham* used for self realization. The great poet Kalidas worshiped lord Shiv and goddess Parvathi in his magnum opus *Raghuvansham* to establish the inseparable relationship between word and meaning. He says, "I salute the parents of the world (Parvathi and Parameshwara) who are inseparable like the *vak* (word) and *artha* (meaning)". For Indian philosopher and mystic Aurobindo, words have their own life; In ancient times words were not mere symbols of communication, rather words manifested intellectual ideas, feelings, sensations and mental impressions. But words in modern digitally driven times are short lived and hence are used unsparingly, bereft of thought and idea. Words, as Martin Heidegger says, "function as ideological apparatus"; one's language must be qualified by being मितभाषिता (*reticence*), मृद्दभाषिता (*soft spoken*), सत्यभाषिता (*truthfulness*) and विचारभाषिता (*eloquence*).

The worldview constructed by words gets represented in literature as social reality and truth. Since language or words are cultural products, words are the marker of one's identity and selfhood. Soviet semiotician Yuri M. Lotman rightly said, "no language can exist unless it is steeped in the context of culture and no culture can exist which does not have at its centre the structure of natural languages". Hence in the words of Bhartrhari, "जगत सर्वे शब्दें भाष्यते" (we take cognizance of the world through words) i.e. word is world.



Shabada (The Word)

As Indians, we all know about the concept and importance of '*Shabda Brahma'* (the eternal sound, *OM*) which reverberates in the cosmos. It is a verbal testimony manifested by the sound as well as the innate capacity to convey meaning. Interestingly, the discovery of the fact that inside the atom, the nucleus is nothing more than an oscillating field, a wave of rhythm where subatomic particles are shadows dancing in pure rhythm—this revelation in modern science has surfaced many Noble laureates, renowned physicists and social scientists (Einstein, 1952; Bohr, 1958; Heisenberg, 1962; Schrodinger, 1967; Prigogine,



1977; Charon, 1977; Bohm, 1980; Capra, 2015; Wendt, 2015; Burgess, 2018) and it has had far-reaching ontological and epistemological implications for our understanding of the world. Recently, in 2022, people on Earth were able to hear the planetary sounds of Mars — thanks to two microphones installed on board NASA's Perseverance Rover. Even our bodies have rhythm and sound like the heart-beats, breathing, synchronic vibration of vocal-cords etc. Therefore, it's not out of place to mention that a 'Word' as a morpho-phonemic unit actually illumines the world.

Imagine a world without any words, any language, where everybody is dumb ! No communication ! No action, no dynamics at all ! Can we live without words? Words are the building blocks of any language. To borrow from Frantz Fannon, "To speak a language is to take on a world, a culture." The great sacred text Bhagwad Gita says, "Words that do not cause distress, are truthful, inoffensive and beneficial, as well as regular recitation of the Vedic scripture – these are declared austerity of speech." (Ch.17, V-15). The Chinese philosopher and Zen master Lao Tzu reverberates Bhagwad Gita in saying, 'Truthful words are not beautiful; beautiful words are not truthful. Good words are not persuasive; persuasive words are not good." It is words that make a style of writing, of speaking, representing a character, reflect illiteracy and education, create a profession, sociolect, dialect and register, genres and even broad classification of literature worldwide. Words create word- boundaries, associations, collocations, appositions, oppositions, call for selection restriction, create clause hierarchy, syntactic structures etc. The power of words can also be seen in their capacity of carrying and conveying meaning which can be denotative, connotative, implied, and suggestive/cognitive. Besides, whether spoken, written and even the mind-talks (thoughts), these words greatly affect our consciousness and psyche.

It is words that make a style of writing, of speaking, representing a character, create a profession, make a dialect or register, genres and even broad classification of literature worldwide roots from linguistic choice of words. A text, whether considered as a whole work or as an extract from a work, is the nearest when we can get to a homogeneous and specific use of language. We can critically study and appreciate a text when more systematic attention to what words or structures chosen in preference to others, is done. In other words, for an effective communication and for any literary discourse, a balanced choice of appropriate words is the thumb rule. Rumi rightly puts it, "Raise your words, not your voice. It is rain that grows flowers, not thunder !"

Words Matter

Expression through words, written or spoken, is a gift bestowed exclusively upon human beings. Words do matter. They

bear the capacity to make or mar the effect. They can cause a never-healing wound, thus taking a situation beyond reconciliation; or else, bring two sworn enemies together. As such, the choice of words has to be absolutely meticulous. Time and again, we find people explaining: "This is not what I meant." Obviously, there is nothing wrong with their intention. Where they faltered was the choice of appropriate expression. In fact, using the language is an art that one learns the hard way. It is a never-ending process. To those for whom everything is political, words carry specific ideological meaning. Such people may be inclined to interpret every word and expression from a particular ideological lens. Feminists may label certain



expressions as 'androcentric'; dalits may object to certain 'caste-markers' and so on. Even in their apolitical, non-ideological usage, words are loaded with multiple layers of meaning that are conveyed not only through the spoken or written word but the overall linguistic and cultural environment as well.

Words Not Just Words

भाषा और शब्द

मनुष्य सर्वाधिक शिक्षित एवं सामाजिक प्राणी है। समाज में रहते हुए उसे विचार - विमर्श की आवश्यकता होती है। इसीलिए मानव-जीवन में भाषा अपना एक महत्वपूर्ण स्थान रखती है। भाषा आद्योपान्त समाज से संबंधित होती है। भाषा का उद्भव और विकास समाज में हुआ। उसका अर्जन सामाजिक प्राणियों के द्वारा किया गया और इसका उपयोग भी समाज में ही होता है।

भाषा में शब्द का महत्व स्वतः सिद्ध है, क्योंकि भाषा में मूलतः दो ही तत्व होते हैं - शब्द और व्याकरण। शब्द को ही विचार मान सकते हैं, क्योंकि शब्द ही विचार का विधायक है। भाषा सामाजिक प्राणियों के मस्तिष्क में एकत्रित विकासशील अभिव्यक्ति का माध्यम है, तो शब्द भाषा की सार्थक स्वतंत्र लघुतम इकाई है। शब्दों को जब व्याकरण का आधार मिल जाता है, तब वह भाषा के रूप में हमारे सामने आता है। मूल शब्द के एक अथवा अनेक अर्थ होते हैं। व्याकरण के अभाव में अनेक शब्दों का समूह अपना पूर्ण अर्थ प्रकट कर दे, यह कदापि संभव नहीं है। किसी ना किसी प्रकार का व्याकरणिक आधार प्राप्त करके ही भाषा अपना पूर्ण अर्थ प्रदान प्रकार यह स्पष्ट है कि शब्द सार्थक इकाई है और भाषा पूर्ण अभिव्यक्ति का आधार है। भाषा अनंत है। इसलिए इसे पवामान वाहिनी की संज्ञा दी जा सकती है। शब्द विकासशील होते हुए भी प्रायः पोखर के रूप में होते हैं जो अन्तः भाव-स्त्रोत होने से सदा प्रयुक्त हो सकते हैं या प्रयोग की शिथिलता, संबंधित वस्तु के अभाव में, प्रचलन की समाप्ति पर धीरे-धीरे लुप्त हो जाते हैं।

भाषा मानव की वह सर्वोत्तम पोशाक है, जिसके माध्यम से वह समाज के रंगमंच पर अभिनय करता है। शब्द ऐसी पोशाक के ताने -बाने के रूपों में होते हैं।

"भाषा यादृच्छिक उच्चारित ध्वनि - प्रतीकों की वह सार्थक समष्टि है जिसके माध्यम से किसी समाज अथवा वर्ग विशेष के मानव परस्पर भावों और विचारों को अभिव्यक्त करते हैं।" इसलिए हम कह सकते हैं कि भावाभिव्यक्ति का माध्यम है भाषा। भाषा के उच्चरित तथा लिखित दोनों ही रूपों में शब्दों का क्रमशः योग होता है, अर्थात एक - एक शब्द के क्रमिक - उपयोगी प्रयोग से भाषा का रूप प्रकट होता है। इस प्रकवर भाषा समाज - विनिर्मित भावाभिव्यक्ति का मूलाधार है और उसकी निर्धारित इकाइयों में शब्द सर्वाधिक महत्वपूर्ण हैं।

Words Matter
