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Concept Note: Folklore and Mythology are often intertwined in scholarly discussions. References to folklore can be traced earlier but William John Thoms formally used the word 'folklore' in 1846. The notion of folklore surfaced among the European scholars during this time. Originally, the term folklore referred to traditions, ancient customs, surviving festivals, old rhymes, timeless ballads, legends, fables, and enduring tales and proverbs. It represents the collective cultural expressions of a specific group, often tied to a particular region, ethnicity, or community. Folklore includes concepts such as tradition, closeness to nature, indigenousness, and traditional knowledge systems of communities passed down through generations via storytelling, songs, traditions, rituals, and performances. Mythology on the other hand is the study of sacred accounts or fables of a culture known as myths or the collection of such stories which deals with various aspects of the human condition. These narratives often feature gods, heroes, and supernatural entities, playing an essential role in constructing religious or cultural identity. Myths narrate fantastic events and it is assumed that they are simply narrative with no factual base, but myths are also an expansion of alternative realities i.e. use of symbolic language, ethical frameworks and fundamental questions of existence that aligns with scientific explanations. It provides insights into the collective consciousness of communities and maintains specific social order. Undoubtedly, myths play a vital role in human civilization, serving as a significant cultural force, and the same can be said about folklore. Both folklore and mythology act as repositories of shared human experiences, beliefs, and imaginations thereby influencing cultures, mirroring the wisdom and aspirations of varied communities. To reconnect with the roots and traditions of one's region and to explore a deeper meaning of life, it is vital to investigate the study and research of folklores and mythologies. This exploration can provide insights into the evolution and existence of humanity.

The conference titled, "Cultural Chronicles: Perspectives on Folklore and Mythology," aims at detailed exploration of the rich tapestry of global folklore and mythology for unravelling the intricate narratives of culture throughout history. There will be an investigation into multidimensional perspectives and various facets on the folklore and mythology and how they act as cultural records woven over time and space further examining their significance and continuing impact on societies. The theorizing of the cultural, psychological, social and anthropological dimensions of folklore and mythology will give a broader understanding of humanity's shared cultural heritage.

About the Department:

Established in the year 2007, the Department of English is one of the first University Teaching Departments (UTDs) of Bhagat Phool Singh Mahila Vishwavidyalaya created to offer qualitative and affordable programmes in English Studies. Driven by Indian grammarian and philosopher Bhartrhari's (570AD) statement (we take cognizance of the world through words), the department of English endeavors to evolve and strengthen the aesthetic, literary and linguistic understanding of life through literature and language. The key objective is to enable the enrolled students and scholars to become critical thinkers and proficient users of English language rooted in native culture and literary traditions. Qualitative, socially relevant, academically challenging and culturally appropriate research with determined outcome is promoted by the Department of English in areas like British Poetry, Indian Poetics, Comparative Literature, ELT, Stylistics, Pragmatics, Semiotics, Metaphor, Translation Studies & Indian Literature in Translation, Marginal Writings, Oral Literature, Cognitive Semantics, Drama, Women Studies, Folk Literature, Indian Writings in English, Diaspora Writings, Performance Studies, Contemporary World Theatre, Cultural Studies, Critical & Literary Theories etc.

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Brief Introduction of the University:

Since Vedic period, Education has empowered women in several ways. One such seminal and historical step in this direction was establishment of the Girls' Gurukul by Bhagat Phool Singh Ji in 1936 at village Khanpur Kalan in Sonipat district of Haryana State. The noble work initiated by Bhagat Phool Singh Ji was continued by his daughter Padamshree Subhahshini Devi Ji benefitting thousands of rural women. The erstwhile Gurukul was turned into a State University in August 2006 exclusively for women named after Bhagat Phool Singh Ji as Bhagat Phool Singh Mahila Vishwavidyalaya (BPSMV). The University has the distinction of being North India's first State Women University spread over pollution free 400 acres of campus. The university is unique in the sense that it functions on the model of 'society- university interface', juxtaposition of tradition and modernity and having its genesis in the philanthropic tradition. The Girls' Gurukul started with just three girls has turned into today's BPSMV with approximately 7000 girls on its rolls enrolled in approximately 100 academic programmes administered through its 18 University Teaching Departments, 02 Constituent Institutions, 05 Special Centers, 02 Regional Centers and 06 affiliated Government Women Colleges. The University consequently became a sought after destination by women for getting modern education grounded in Indian tradition and universal human values.
